Signed into Law on February 22, 2012, the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act created the <u>First Responder Network Authority</u> (FirstNet). The law gives FirstNet the mission to build, operate and maintain the first high-speed, nationwide wireless broadband network dedicated to public safety. FirstNet will provide a single interoperable platform for emergency and daily public safety communications.

PRESENTERS

Major General Mark S. Inch, The Provost Marshal General of the Army Commanding General, United States Army Criminal Investigation Command and Army Corrections Command



Major General Inch was commissioned a Second Lieutenant and awarded a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Biblical Archaeology in 1982 from Wheaton College, IL. He holds a Masters Degree in Geography with a Concentration in Middle East/ Africa from the University of Texas at Austin and a Masters of Military Arts and Science Degree from the School of Advanced Military Studies (SAMS). His military education includes the Military Police Officer Basic and Advance Courses, the Command and General Staff College, the Joint and Combined Warfighting School and the Senior Service College Fellowship—Advanced Operational Arts Studies. He completed professional certification with the

American Correctional Association (ACA) and was the first member to earn the Certified Corrections Executive (CCE) designation with Honor.

His principal staff assignments have been as Deputy Provost Marshal (UNITED NATIONS OPERATION SOMALIA II, MOGADISHU); Battalion S-3 and XO, 759th MP Battalion, Fort Carson, CO; Deputy Provost Marshal, United State Forces Japan, Yokota Air Base; Chief, Corrections and Internment Branch, Operations Readiness and Mobilization Directorate, G-3 and later Office of the Provost Marshal general, Washington DC; Director, Detainee Operations, Combined Security Transition Command-Afghanistan, (OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM, AFGHANISTAN); Chief of Staff, Task Force 134, Detainee Operations (OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM, IRAQ).

He commanded the 194th MP Company, Heilbronn, FRG; Area Confinement facility, Fort Ord, CA; 705th MP Battalion, United States Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, KS; Commandant/ Commander, United States Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, KS; Deputy Provost Marshal General/Commander, Army Corrections Command, Washington, DC; Commandant, United States Army Military Police School, Fort Leonard Wood, MO; Commander, Combined Joint Interagency Task Force 435, (OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM, AFGHANISTAN).

Major General Inch's awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters, the Bronze Star Medal, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Meritorious Service Medal with four oak clusters, the Army Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Army Achievement Medal with one oak leaf cluster, a series of Unit, Campaign and Service medals, and the Army Staff Identification Badge.

PRESENTERS

Commissioner Charles H. Ramsey, Philadelphia Police Department



Commissioner Charles H. Ramsey leads the fourth largest police department in the nation with 6,500 and 800 civilian members. He was appointed Philadelphia Police Commissioner in 2008. Commissioner Ramsey brings forty-six years of law enforcement service, experience and expertise to the post. Before taking the helm in Philadelphia, he served as Washington, D.C. Police Chief. While he was Chief of the Metropolitan Police Department (1998-2006) crime rates in the nation's capital declined by about 40 percent, and the district regained its reputation as a national leader in urban policing. Before D.C., he was a Deputy Superintendent in the Chicago Police Department. There, he was instrumental in designing and implementing the Chicago Alternative Policing Strategy that became a nationally acclaimed model of community policing.

Commissioner Ramsey has worked diligently to advance the law enforcement profession. He has long been at the forefront of developing innovative policing strategies, evidence-based initiatives, organizational accountability and neighborhood-based programs, while leading organizational change in police departments. As president of major city chiefs, Ramsey created the Leadership Executive Institute to help prepare police chiefs of the future. Working with the Anti-Defamation League and the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, he led the creation of law enforcement and society: lessons from the holocaust. More than 90-thousand local, state and federal law enforcement personnel from across the country have gone to see the program. He is currently working with The National Constitution Center to develop a program for recruits and in-service training that focuses on the role of policing in a complex democratic society.

Under his leadership, the Philadelphia Police Department has continued to make significant progress in driving down violent crime in the city. From 2007, when there were 396 homicides in Philadelphia to last year, when the number of people murdered in the city was 248, the homicide rate dropped 37%, a 50% drop in homicides compared to the city's 1990 peak of 500. In 2014 the city experienced fewer violent crimes than at any time since 1985.

Commissioner Ramsey is nationally and internationally recognized among law enforcement peers for his law enforcement expertise. He is the immediate past President of the Police Executive Research Forum and the Major Cities Chiefs Association. He is the only law enforcement professional to have been president of both of these prominent positions simultaneously. He also serves on the International Association of Chiefs of Police Executive Committee.

Recently President Barack Obama called on Commissioner Ramsey to co-chair the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing as it seeks ways to help strengthen police community relations across the country. He also serves on the United States Homeland Security Advisory Council, which provides advice and recommendations to the US Department of Homeland Security Secretary, Jeh Johnson. In 2007, Ramsey was a security consultant to the United States Senate Sergeant of Arms and the Washington, D.C. Convention Center. During that year, he served on the Independent Commission on Security Forces of Iraq, leading a prominent group of law enforcement professionals in a review of Iraqi Police Forces. The report they generated was submitted to the United States Congress and garnered international attention and praise.

A native of Chicago, Illinois, Ramsey served in the Chicago Police Department for nearly three decades in a variety of assignments.

He holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees in criminal justice from Lewis University in Romeoville, Illinois. Commissioner Ramsey has lectured nationally on a wide range of law enforcement topics.



PRESENTERS

Joshua A. Ederheimer, Senior Law Enforcement Advisor, FirstNet, U.S. Department of Commerce



Joshua A. Ederheimer is the Senior Law Enforcement Advisor, FirstNet, U.S. Department of Commerce. Prior to that, he was Principal Deputy Director at the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services, U.S. Department of Justice. Prior to coming to the Department, Mr. Ederheimer spent more than 22 years at the Metropolitan Police Department of the District of Columbia (MPD), where he attained the rank of Assistant Chief. As a member of MPD, he served in a variety of areas including: patrol, investigations, administration, and command. During his tenure at MPD, some of his most noteworthy projects included the creation of the Civil Rights

and Force Investigation Division, Compliance Monitoring Team (for the implementation of an agreement with the DOJ Civil Rights Division), and Professional Development Bureau.

In addition, Mr. Ederheimer served three years as the Director of the Center on Force and Accountability at the Police Executive Research Forum in Washington, D.C. As the Center's founding Director, Mr. Ederheimer conducted research and provided guidance to law enforcement organizations—nationally and abroad—on police use of force, accountability, and leadership topics. He led both federally and privately supported national police initiatives and provided technical assistance to law enforcement agencies on various topics.

In 2002, Mr. Ederheimer received the Cafritz Award from the George Washington University's Center for Excellence in Public Leadership for his reforms implemented at MPD in the Civil Rights and Force investigation Division. Mr. Ederheimer holds a bachelor's degree in Justice from American University, and a master's degree in Management and Leadership from Johns Hopkins University.

From Northern New Jersey and New York:

Take the New Jersey Turnpike South to the Garden State Parkway (Exit 11). Follow the Garden State Parkway South to Exit 105 (or Route 18, Exit 13B) to Route 36 East. Follow Route 36 East approximately 6.4 miles to Ocean Boulevard, Long Branch. Turn right onto Ocean Boulevard, and proceed approximately 0.5 miles to Ocean Place, on the left.

From Western New Jersey and Philadelphia:

Take the New Jersey Turnpike North to Interstate 195 East (Exit 7A). Follow Interstate 195 East to the Garden State Parkway (Exit 36). Take the Garden State Parkway North to Exit 105 to Route 36 East. Follow Route 36 East approximately 6.4 miles to Ocean Boulevard, Long Branch. Turn right onto Ocean Boulevard, and proceed approximately 0.5 miles to Ocean Place, on the left.
